Summary: This is a story of a little girl growing up on a farm. She plays in the haymow; she drives

the tractor for putting up hay, and she plays hide and seek behind the cows. All the while, the music plays in the barn and she tries to learn to yodel just like the cowgirls she hears on the radio. This Minnesota Book Award winner was recently reprinted in

paperback by a Minnesota publisher.

Suggested ages: 4-6, 7-10, all ages

Tips for Reading:• Listen to some country western and yodeling music and practice the singing and yodeling lines in the book before you read the book aloud to children.

youening lines in the book before you read the book aloud to children.

When you read the story a second time, ask the children to yodel along with you.

• Use a cow puppet or any farm toy as a prop to help you tell the story.

• Do you know what yodeling music sounds like? before reading:

What is your favorite kind of music?

Do you have any pet animals? What are their names?

Have you ever visited a farm?

• Where does milk come from? How is milk used to make other foods?

Where does mink come from: How is mink ased to make other loods.

We're going to read a story about a little girl growing up on a farm. As you listen to the story, think about your five senses. What does the little girl see, hear, taste, smell and

touch?



Questions After Reading:

- What does the little girl see, hear, taste, smell and touch?
- What does the little girl want to learn to do?
- What was the relationship like between the little girl and her father?
- The little girl and her friends play hide and seek behind the cows. What kinds of games do you play with your friends?
- For her eighth birthday party, the little girl and her friends dress up as cowgirls. Have you ever dressed in costume for a party? What did you wear?

RELATED ACTIVITIES

Art:

Make a collage of pictures of cows from magazines.

Language:

- Write about a real or imaginary visit to a farm.
- Use sensory details to describe a favorite memory you have about a pet or animal you saw.

Music:

 Listen to old-time country music, such as Patsy Montana's "I Want to Be a Cowboy's Sweetheart" or Dale Evans and Roy Rogers singing, "Happy Trails to You."

Other:

Shake a jar of cream until it turns to butter. Yummmmm.
